Big Flat Electric pole-top and bucket-truck rescue

pole-top and bucket-truck rescue. This is an annual requirement that OSHA has mandated electric linemen do. They need to show proficiency getting a person down from the pole if he or she has become unable to do so on their own

So, let's start by explaining the purpose of the rescue practice. Twenty years ago, electric linemen climbed poles several times a day, which was normal for them. Since then, we have better equipment — bucket trucks — to access poles and equipment on the poles. Most co-op's have several bucket trucks, and we can also access most power poles with an aerial device. The art of climbing has changed from 20 years ago.

In 2014, OSHA updated regulations that govern electrical linemen. This new rule made lineman utilize what we call fall protection while they climb power poles. This made everyone in the co-op world purchase new equipment that wraps around the poles, ensuring 100 percent attachment to the pole. This was a big change for linemen as they mostly free climbed up the pole, put a strap around the pole and then went to work. With this old way we had linemen that cutout and fell from the power poles from time to time. When OSHA saw injuries from the falls, it prompted the requirement to use new fall protection while climbing. This greatly prevented pole-climbing accidents. The other thing is when linemen climbed, they de-energized the lines so they could work on the pole. This caused co-op members to lose power while linemen did the work. Now, with the use of bucket trucks, our linemen can keep the power on while they do the work, most of the time. There are cases when taking an outage and de-energizing the line is safer for the line crew.

Getting back to pole-top and bucket-truck rescues, the importance of getting employees down as fast and safely as possible is the reason we do it. If a lineman gets hurt



while they are working on the lines, they may only have four minutes before irreversible and permanent damage is done to the body. Getting up and doing a rescue needs to be done as safe and fast as possible so CPR can begin on an unresponsive employee.

Pole-top rescue is a critical safety procedure for power linemen, enabling them to save a coworker who is unconscious or unresponsive atop a utility pole, often due to electrocution or injury.


